Context: The virtual meetings build on the discussions at the 19th [Steering Committee meeting](#) in Seoul, Republic of Korea (5-6 December 2019), and the [strategy paper](#) that frames the preparations of the 2020-22 Work Programme. It will be an important step to move from the vision and strategic considerations for the next work programme to the articulation of tangible outcomes and concrete actions to position development effectiveness as a key driver for the implementation of the 2030 Agenda.

The Steering Committee plans to review and adopt a new work programme, at strategic level, at the next Steering Committee meeting, which will take place in New York on 11-12 May 2020. The work programme will guide the Global Partnership's work up until the next High-Level Meeting in 2022, half way to 2030. The workshop is a timely opportunity to fine-tune proposed activities, and bring together different actors with an interest in specific areas of work, to energize vibrant and well-balanced alliances of stakeholders.

Action areas and co-leadership: The strategy paper, welcomed by the Steering Committee in Seoul, has set the course for the work programme, with a new vision and three strategic priorities – accelerating development effectiveness to deliver the 2030 Agenda, building better partnerships, and leveraging monitoring for action – in a range of proposed areas of work, including a review of the Global Partnership. Since the 18th Steering Committee meeting in Seoul, members have consulted interested parties on the proposals. Indicative arrangements, which are still open to stakeholders, in particular from partner countries, follow:

Participants will have different levels of knowledge of the Global Partnership, meriting an introductory session on the co-chairs' vision and the objectives of the workshop.

Tuesday, 17 March 2020

A New Work Programme for the Decade of Delivery (1 hour)

Objective: Ensure a shared common understanding of the objectives of the workshop, in particular the focus on moving from an agreed vision and proposals for action areas for the 2020-22 GPEDC work programme to the articulation of tangible outcomes and concrete actions that respond to needs and harness opportunities at country level.

Format: Co-chairs' welcome and introduce to the vision and framing of the new work programme, the strategic priorities and the proposed action areas as agreed at the last SC meeting in Seoul. The session chair will introduce to the objectives, with a particular emphasis on looking for opportunities for the Global Partnership work programme to offer solutions to address needs and challenges of partner countries. She will talk about how the meeting is run, immediate next steps, and – after the opening – invite several partner countries sharing needs and challenges in different country contexts.

Introduction to Action Areas (1.5 hour)

Objective: Provide action area leads with an opportunity to provide an initial pitch of their action area, focusing on how each action area will help meet the strategic priorities of the work programme. This is also an opportunity for those not yet familiar with ongoing work under different action areas to familiarise themselves with the substance and consider joining subsequent breakout sessions for more in-depth discussions to finalise the respective proposals.

Format: The session is organised as a plenary meeting where action area leads will pitch their proposals and initial clarifying questions may be asked, and This will be followed by action area leads offering, in two sentences, what each action area will do to meet the strategic priorities of the work programme and

Objective: Finetune proposals for action areas where drafts exist (level of ambition, expected outcomes and outputs) and prepare a presentation to plenary that responds to guiding questions from the project proposal template (including anchoring work at country level, constituency and GPI engagement, learning, outreach and advocacy) and discuss expectations, while also allowing groups that have newly or recently constituted to develop an initial pitch, and those not yet associated with individual groups to listen into groups of interest.

Format: Breakouts by action areas, led by leads of each action area and test interest of partner countries.

Wednesday, 18 March 2020

Testing the Waters: Are Action Areas Fit for Purpose? (up to 2 hours)

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Chair: Mr. Vitalice Meja, Reality of Aid

Objective: Test the action area proposals with participants, exploring whether they respond to needs and address relevant challenges in line with the vision of the new work programme and its foundational elements and give real time feedback in a 'hard talk' set-up with an active audience.

The pitches will respond to key questions, including: What effectiveness challenges are you addressing? What are your proposed objectives and outcomes? Why and how is this relevant at the country level? What is the Global Partnership's niche in this area? How will you engage stakeholders and promote momentum? Etc.

Format: Each action area lead will pitch their respective action area proposal in a short, 5-7 minute (timed!) presentation – limited to problem statement, proposed objectives and outcomes, why this is relevant, in particular at the country level, what the GPEDC niche is and how to engage stakeholders – for feedback by others. The floor will be opened after each pitch for Q&A, a type of 'hard talk', possibly with pre-determined interviewers around the agreed questions, and a reflection on what the action area should improve.

Thursday, 19 March 2020

How can the GPEDC best provide support at the country level? (1 hour)

Objective: By looking horizontally across the ambitions and activities planned for the next work programme, this session provides an opportunity to articulate effectiveness challenges and the support participants - in particular partner countries - consider paramount in making development co-operation more effective at the country level. It will look at how specific country-level activities proposed in the action areas can best be implemented by blending into existing, ongoing work, with the right counter parts, and by accelerating the voice and engagement of partner countries. The session will provide important context and insights for the finalisation of the level of ambition and outcomes of action areas that are firmly anchored at the country level.

Format: Plenary set-up, with JST and partner countries sharing challenges first, followed by interactive discussion.

The Global Partnership's Monitoring Exercise – The Case for Reform (up to 2 hours)

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Chair: Mr. Vitalice Meja, Reality of Aid

Objective: This session will have two objectives:

- (1) [up to 1 hour] to invite perspectives on the key challenges and problems to be addressed through the reform of the monitoring process, as an input to inform decisions on the parameters and potential scope of the revision of this aspect

of the monitoring exercise. This discussion will be introduced with a brief overview of some of the known challenges and trade-offs related to the monitoring process, drawn from the post-monitoring exit survey, the recent virtual survey on the monitoring process, and other stakeholder feedback. Building on the previous session on country-level anchoring, participants will be encouraged to reflect on how the monitoring process can better support accountability for Busan commitments as well as build on and support existing country level efforts.

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(3) (2) [up to 1 hour] to identify synergies between the proposed SP3 and the objectives and activities of other action areas, towards encouraging that the work of the other action areas contributes to the monitoring reform – and vice versa. Participants will be asked to reflect on and share views on a set of key questions which will be introduced by the Session Chair.

Format: Plenary set-up. The Chair will moderate the session in two parts (up to 1 hour each), organised according to the two objectives. For each of the two parts, there will be a short introductory framing, followed by interactive discussion in plenary.

Friday, 20 March 2020

Developing a collective narrative for the 2020-22 work programme and Closing (up to two hours)

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Chair: Ms. Andrea Ries, Switzerland

Objective: Agree on a joint narrative to support advocacy and outreach around the vision of the new work programme, drawing conclusions from the work in the previous sessions and bringing work from the different action areas together.

Format: Interactive discussion. Introduced by Co-Chairs – a 'high-level' narrative/headline messages (based on Day 1 pitches) following interactive discussion with feedback from participants to fine tune the headline messages. This will be followed by a reflection by Co-chairs on how the different pieces of the puzzle fit together and how we ensure political momentum in the run up to the third High-Level Meeting in 2022.

Followed by the closing session:

Objective: Co-chairs to outline next steps and further work is to finalise the work programme ahead of the Steering Committee in New York on 11-12 May.
